Racing News Dean Conti, Race Fleet Captain Duane Rubash, Assistant Race Fleet Captain Cruising News

There continues to be little racing around the Salish Sea this summer. Putting a full crew on a small boat does not seem like a safe



environment. Rats! Hopefully, everyone is getting out on the water with close family and enjoying this wonderful weather.

We had a successful first work party on the three missing race marks. Forms for three concrete anchors were built and attached to my flatbed trailer. Reinforcing re-bar and the center eye were welded together. A task for next week is to get the concrete poured. We have been successful getting it donated at the concrete batch plant when the trucks return with their excess in the afternoon.

Next is to assemble all the ground tackle. We start with a shackle and swivel attaching a 10-15 foot length of chain to the bottom of the mark. Some of the marks are internally ballasted, others need an external weight that consists of a five-gallon bucket with an eye sticking out each end. A flexible plastic tube is slid over the end of the nylon line and spliced around an over-size thimble. Another shackle and swivel at the anchor completes the assembly. We are trying to incorporate more plastic in the design as it seems to resist chafing and corrosion degradation better. Expect a call for volunteers later in the month when we are ready for assembly. The marks will need their final cleaning and painting at the last minute before splashing them back in the water.

Marina District Neighborhood Response to Parking at the Marina

Here is the draft Bill Linscott sent to me.

"MDN 2020-7-25 Update
Update - Marina District Neighborhood (MDN)

First and foremost, we hope all of you are safe and doing well during these terrible pandemic times. Please take care and stay safe as we progress to better days ahead.

It has been a while since we've sent out a *Marina District Update* regarding the City's activities of interest to our neighborhood. Understandably, the City has been focused on attending to the virus issues and immediate City business. In the more recent City Council meetings, however, they have begun to return to several plans and actions to move forward with City improvements and economic development. One of these actions was mentioned in the July 16 City Council Meeting and deals with paid parking controls at the Marina and Redondo. This will need our community attention and comment.

The Current Setting:

Marina Parking controls have a gated access method and two options for visitors: An electronic pass card that can be purchased by the public; or hourly parking which is accommodated with dispensing a ticket upon gate entry and paying at several pay stations or at the gate with a credit card as you leave.

Redondo Parking controls have a "pay and display" method. This method does not have an access gate controlled parking lot. Instead, you park your vehicle as you arrive. Then, proceed to the pay station to purchase a ticket for the time you intend to stay, which is to be displayed in your vehicle.

We understand the City would like to have a common system for paid parking and control methods that is consistent at both locations. Public comment is being sought from residents, visitors and Marina boating tenants regarding these controls. This insight will be used by the City in making a decision on the best solution to be maintained and how those controls will work. This may also be the time to offer other thoughts on parking controls that you believe could be considered for these locations.

With the COVID 19 restrictions on public gatherings, it looks like a public meeting would be difficult to hold. As such, individual written comments are essential.

Your Action: Please take time for your consideration and communication to the City Council, letting them know what and why you want parking controls. A City link for public comment is shown below.

Timing: We should have our comments in by no later than August 20, as we understand City staff will be assembling their recommendations for a City Council presentation in the September time period.

Des Moines Area Boating Community Members Help in Times of Need

The South Sound boating community has been contributing to the greater community in these times of need.

Recent contributions this year include:

Des Moines Marina Association (DMMA), the organization comprised of Marina tenants and others interested in the health of the Des Moines Marina, contributed \$1,000 to the Des Moines Food Bank, and \$500 to the Des Moines Farmers Market for signage, Personal Protective Equipment, and advertising to run a safe market. The Board of the DMMA is looking into additional ways to help with contributions and awareness for the needs of our community.
Three Tree Point Yacht Club donated \$2,100 to the Des Moines Food Bank. In lieu of holding their normal spring sailboat race series, canceled due to COVID-19, they organized a socially distanced predicted log contest, with participants donating money to the Food Bank.
America's Boating Club, formally known as the Poverty Bay Power Squadron, has an annual fundraising campaign that raises nearly \$1,000 for the Food Bank and other needy causes.
Des Moines Yacht Club awarded three \$1,000 college scholarships to outstanding Mt. Rainier graduates through their Navigating the Future Scholarship program. They also donated \$750 to the Des Moines Food Bank.
